In addition to papers on the conference focus topic, papers on all core topics of Human Security are welcome, including, but not limited to:

- Philosophical and ethical foundations of the Human Security approach;
- Methodological issues in operationalizing the Human Security approach;
- Capability measurement and empirical analysis;
- Human rights and development;
- Policy analysis and evaluation by reference to Human Security.

Human security is evidently surrounded by numerous threats. The intensity of old threats has increased (different forms of violence), new ones have emerged, while at the same time, challenges of globalisation, urbanisation and technological (ICT) revolution have underlined the inability of states and governments to develop new policies. It has turned out that the world is not prepared for many of these threats. A wave of new technologies is moving fast and causing changes on a global level, simultaneously affecting every individual human being and every community, whereas the fusion of technologies has resulted in a “blurred line between physical, digital and biological sphere“.

At the beginning of the 21st century, predictions from the end of the past century have been not only fulfilled, but far exceeded in many aspects – the number and types of problems accompanying every technological development are increasing exponentially. By suggesting the following topics for the 4th International Academic Conference on Human Security, therefore, we would like to reach and propose some solutions to the current and pressing problems pertaining to technology-human being relation from a human security perspective and within the context of its multifaceted nature. What are the ethical aspects of the use of drones in modern warfare, is artificial intelligence leading us into a new age founded on new conceptions of state and nation, are the open data uncovering enough or maybe too much, do we have (the right to) privacy in the era of digital footprint, and other interesting, provoking and pressing issues – these are the questions we will endeavour to address and to shed light on during the 4th International Academic Conference on Human Security to be organised by the Human Security Research Center.

This conference will provide a forum for scientists and researchers to present and offer possible ways how new technologies can help international actors, governments and civil society organisations to prevent violence, conflicts and other disputes labelled as ‘security’ in the most efficient way. We will learn how individuals and communities use information-communication technologies, about their advantages and disadvantage, and try to find an answer to the question whether new technologies make people feel safer or less safe. All the above mentioned will include the examples of how new technologies are applied and how do they affect a number of challenges, risks and threats, e.g. migration, different forms of violence, natural and human disasters, threats to political security, health security, environmental security, economic security, security of cultural heritage, security of individuals and communities.

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While preparing the conference programme, we will try to step out of traditional conference framework, based on lectures and presentations, and offer a combination of lectures, case studies, poster presentations, practical sessions and demonstrations how to use tools in a safe and structured environment, for the benefit of all participants. We want to provide our participants with an opportunity to learn actively, connect and networking with other participants, exchange experiences and finally be able to better plan, analyse and react adequately to the threats which can be posed by new technologies.

Submission guidelines

The Paper should be written in English

The Abstract (up to 300 words); Times New Roman 11–point font, single spaced

Keywords: up to five words

Text: Times New Roman, 12pts, 1.5 spacing, justified, 12,000 characters, with the following margins: Top 2.5 cm; Bottom 2.5 cm; Left 3 cm; Right 3cm

References: All sources should be listed in alphabetical order and in accordance with the APA Citation Style.

Conference Proceedings

All the submitted papers will be blind-reviewed by two competent reviewers and presented in the Proceedings Book with an adequate ISBN number. The Proceedings Book and certificate of participation will be distributed to the conference participants at the conference registration desk.
